### **Feast Day**

#### July 21st St Lawrence of Brindisi

St Lawrence died at Lisbon on this date 1619 while on his way to the court of King Philip 111 to plead the case of the poor people of Naples July 22<sup>nd</sup> St Mary Magdalene

Mary Magdalene could be the **Patron Saint of the Slandered**, since she has been persistently mistaken for the sinful woman at the house of Simon the Pharisee (Lk.7;36-50). Mary Magdalene was one of those who stood by the cross of Jesus at the Crucifixion with his mother Mary.

# July 23<sup>rd</sup> St Bridget of Sweden (1303-1373)

Married at fourteen Bridget and her husband had eight children. She worked at the court of King Magnus 11 and was quite put out by the excess she witnessed in the palace. In 1350 she travelled to Rome where she spent the final twenty-four years of her life working energetically for the reform of the Church. She is the Patroness of Sweden and co-patron of Europe.

When little Kathy returns from school she tells her mother what she has learnt. Patiently, her mother listens to her excited story. Today the subject was Christian family life. Then, with obvious pride in her understanding of grown-up affairs, she declares, 'and that's called monotony'.

More like Martha in today's gospel reading than Mary, we busy ourselves with doing, doing, doing. We don't know how to just plain be, especially in this age of endless electronic entertainment.

All too readily we flee from the prospects of being alone, from silence, for the dubious delights of virtual reality. Alone, we become bored, edgy, even scared. Strange, if we truly like ourselves, that this should be so! Perhaps it's because we don't see ourselves as God sees us.

But to get that vision, we too must sit at Jesus' feet and give him our undivided attention – and give it often. Its there we get the energy to do our work with and for others.

## **Croagh Patrick**
